FOREWORD



A NEW LOCAL GOVERNMENT TERM BEGINS!

Dear readers and partners,

The Rwandan Local Government Family has completed a special term marked by tremendous achievements in terms of good governance, socioeconomic development, community resilience and service delivery.

The term, which started in February 2016 was supposed to end in February 2021. Unfortunately, that was not the case. The ongoing COVID19 pandemic emerged in Rwanda in March 2020 and it compelled the Government to amend the law and to reschedule the local government elections from February to October 2021.

This is the time to thank the outgoing District Executive Committee members and their teams for the good job. They faced effects of climate change. Floods have been claiming human lives and infrastructures across the country since 2016, and drought persisted in different parts of the country. They also faced and managed the COVID19 with subsequent several lockdowns. History shall remember them for having played a critical role in saving human lives throughout those challenging and difficult times.

During this term, thatched houses and jiggers were relegated to history in Rwanda. Integrated model villages, classrooms, roads, decent homes for the most vulnerable persons were constructed and inaugurated in every District.

In November 2021, new teams of Councilors and Executive Committees were elected for a fiveyear renewable term. We welcome them and we pledge our full support and collaboration. It is not time for terms, but delivery. The Country shall honor them for their contribution towards socioeconomic transformation.

Upon their election, RALGA in collaboration with the Ministry of Local Government organized for them a week long induction course. Similar induction shall expand to sub district elected leaders. At its' closing, the President of the Republic of Rwanda, H.E Paul KAGAME, urged them to prioritize citizens' interests and address prevailing human security issues.

As the country has embarked on massive vaccination against COVID19 and works hard for recovery, the Rwanda Association of Local Government Authorities stands with its members, namely the City of Kigali and all the Districts, to build their capacity in order to sustain the achievements, ensure service delivery and socioeconomic transformation.

This is a shared responsibility.

IDEAL Project-RWANDA closes, Stakeholders commit to sustain the achievements



at the closing ceremony of IDEAL Project Rwanda

RALGA in collaboration with VNG International implemented the IDEAL Project in Rwanda from mid-2017 to December 2021, with funding from the Netherlands Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

The beneficiary districts were all the six Rwandan secondary cities districts, namely; Muhanga, Huye, Rusizi, Rubavu, Musanze and Nyagatare. It focused and promoted inclusive urban governance through capacity building, advocacy, representation, citizen participation and stakeholder engagement in local urban governance, thus "inclusive decisions at local level".

The main objective of the IDEAL project in Rwanda was to enable social contract between secondary cities districts authorities, the citizens and local stakeholders on local urban development.

The project's activities consisted of capacity building in terms of trainings, learning study visits, developing user-friendly toolkit handbooks for service providers, demonstration projects, awareness campaigns, stakeholder policy dialogues and advocacy research.

The project funding for RALGA implemented activities in the five years amounted to 649,904 Euros.

The project closing meeting which took place in Kigali on 14 December 2021 was attended by H.E Matthijs Wolters, the Ambassador of the Kingdom of the Netherlands in Rwanda, Ladislas Ngendahimana, the Secretary General of RALGA, Daan Stelder, the VNG Project manager and other senior officials from Districts, the City of Kigali and partner institutions. It was an opportunity for stakeholders to take stock of the project achievements in the last five years of implementation and its impact on secondary cities districts on one hand, and to commit as promoters or beneficiaries- to the sustainability of the achievements.

Female University graduates complete professional Internships in Local Government

On 17 December 2021, RALGA in colloaboration with the Ministry of Gender and Family Promotion (MIGEPROF) held a closing ceremony of the second edition of professional internships in Local Government for female fresh university graduates.

A cohort comprising 99 girls and young women who completed the six-month internships in all districts, graduated from different higher learning institutions and universities. Their selection based primarily on best academic performance and in areas with less female representation in both technical and political positions in local governments. This activity, funded by the Ministry of Gender and Family Promotion and UN Women aims at empowering girls to become leaders in their local communities and nurturing them into potential local government leaders, starting from the grassroots.

RALGA initiated the internships program in Local Government for female fresh university graduates in 2019.

Its first edition was completed by 130 girls and women and was funded by GIZ.

Graduates urged to become agent of transformational changes in their communities

The Minister of Gender and Family Promotion, Prof Bayisenge Jeannette, thanked RALGA for initiating this program and for ensuring its successful implementation. She reaffirmed the commitment of the Ministry to support and to mobilize resources for the program to continue.

"The results that have been achieved through this program are really commendable, and they exceed our initial expectations. The fact that some of interns were elected in local government councils is a strong indicator that this program is making positive impact. The Ministry of Gender and Family promotion pledges to continue supporting this program, because of the tangible results we have today," Minister Bayisenge stated.

The Minister also challenged those who completed their internship to become agent of positive transformation in the society.

"I challenge you, on behalf of the Government of Rwanda, to use the knowledge and experience acquired through this internship program for your own future and for the general good of the Rwandan society", Minister Bayisenge added.

RALGA confident that internship program for female graduates will bridge existing gender gap in Local Government

Speaking at the closing ceremony of the second edition of internships for female university graduates, the Secretary General of RALGA, Ngendahimana Ladislas stressed that the country has made a significant progress towards achieving gender equality as a constitutional imperative, whereby a threshold of 30% for women is respected in all decision-making positions, noting that, "this is the minimum, and it should be understood as such. Women do not deserve the minimum but equality. And they should earn it because they can".

Basing on the figures from the recently concluded local government leaders elections, the Secretary General of RALGA observed a big gap in gender equality at local government level in specific positions.

He underlined that though each District elects its Executive Committee members as an entity, and respects the provisions of gender representation, the sum indicates a disparity between men and female.

According to the 2021 Local elections results, women make 40.7% and men make 50.3% of the Executive Committee members with an overall 46% versus 54% of females and males respectively in district councils.

Based on the above figures, Mr Ngendahimana said that, RALGA believes that these internships in local governments for female graduates will contribute to bridging the persisting gender gap in local Government entities.

"This internship program is like sowing the seeds. If we sow good seeds that can produce many fruits, we can be confident to address, in ten years to come, the issue of disparity between men and women in local government positions", Ngendahimana declared.

"As matter of fact, some interns in this cohort competed in recent local government elections and 20 among them were elected in local government councils at different levels," Ngendahimana stressed.

Beneficiaries extol the impact of the program

Beneficiaries of the internships program including both host Districts and interns lauded the impact of the program so far in empowering female graduates and the services that interns rendered to host Districts

Uwiringiyimana Clementine was elected a member of Gisagara District Council, representing women



Speaking on behalf of the interns, she expressed her gratitude to the Government of Rwanda and to RALGA in particular for the opportunity offered to them and promised to make use of the acquired knowledge.

"I and my colleagues would like to express our sincere gratitude to the Government of Rwanda and particularly to His Excellency Paul Kagame, the President of the Republic of Rwanda, for giving us the opportunity to do this internship. Rwanda is a country where it is an honor to be a woman; and we will not disappoint. We shall take advantage of this internship and fight together to promote gender equality and increase the number of women in local governments".

She also made recommendations to the organizers, such extending the internships from six months to one year, increasing the stipend allowances and following up to interns after completion of their internships to ensure they put to use the acquired skills. "This program is important and was much needed. The interns ioin districts with fresh energy, skills and commitment, which are important assets needed by local government

entities to discharge their duties and provide quality services to citizens. They quickly adapt to the extent that, after few months, they serve like other districts' staff.

Through this program, female graduates discover their potential, work together with experienced staff in the implementation of districts' activities and participate in meetings and other forums. This helps them feel they are no longer students and allows them to familiarize with the professional and work environment.

"On behalf all districts authorities, I would request this program to be continued, to be more supported and if possible, to increase the number of interns sent to districts."

In focus, An outline of the 2021 local government elections








The 2021 local elections in Rwanda kicked off on 19 October 2021 at the village level and concluded on 19th November 2021 by the election of districts' councils and executive committees. It was the fourth of its kind since the 2005 reforms in local government structures which reduced the number of districts from 106 to 30, [1].

The electoral process consisted of electing leaders of different decentralized organs including villages committees, members of councils from Cell to District level, districts' executive committees, and committees of national councils namely: The National Youth Council, the National Council of Persons with Disabilities and the National Women Council.

The 2021 local government elections were to be conducted in March 2021 but were postponed due to the covid-19 pandemic. They were moreover preceded by the amendment of the 2019 organic law governing elections [2] law which brought some changes in the composition of some organs and reformed some electoral colleges. The elections also followed the reforms in the governance of the City of Kigali undertaken in 2019, which saw the three districts of the City of Kigali lose their legal personality[3].


The 2021 elections were also carried out in line with the new law Governing the District[4]. The major reform brought by this new law was the reduction of the number of members of districts' councils to 17 in each district, while previously the number of councilors was determined depending on the number of sectors composing each district and representatives of national councils in district councils were reduced from three to one each.

The newly-elected District Executive Committees in 27 Districts are composed of 81 members including Mayors, Vice Mayors in charge of Economic Development and Vice Mayors in charge of Social Affairs. Among them, 43, equivalent to 53% are new, while 38 equivalent to 47% were re-elected as illustrated below:



Notes: At the end of the previous term of Districts Executive Committees, only 77 members were still in their functions. Four districts ended the term without complete Executive Committees as follows:

- Rwamagana (without V/M in charge of economic development)

- Kamonyi (Without mayor)


-Nyanza (Without V/M in charge of social affairs)

- Nyaruguru (Without Mayor)


The number of men is higher than that of women in Districts Executive committees, in all provinces.

The Western Province and Eastern Province have the highest percentage of women in District Executive Committees (48%) while the lowest rate of women in District Executive Committees is in the Southern and Northern Province(33%).


Paricularly, the Western Province has more women than men at the position of District Mayor.




Executive committees in the seven Districts of the Eastern Province are composed of 21 members including 11 men (six Mayors, four Vice mayors in charge of economic affairs and one Vice mayor in charge of social affairs) and 10 women (one Mayor, three Vice Mayors in charge of Economic Development and 6 Vice Mayors in charge of Social Affairs)



Out of 24 members of executive committees in eight districts of the Southern Province, 16 are men (seven mayors, eight Vice Mayors in Charge of Economic Development and one Vice Mayor in charge of Social Affairs) while eight(8) are women (one Mayor and seven Vice Mayors in charge of Social Affairs).



In the Western Province, out of 21 members of district Executive Committee, 11 are males (three Mayors, seven Vice Mayors in chage of Economic Development and one Vice Mayor in charge of Social Affairs) while 10 are females (Four Mayors, Six Vice Mayors in charge of Social Affairs). The Western Province has more female mayors than males.



Out of 15 members of Executive Committees in five districts of the Northern Province, 10 are men (Three Mayors, four Vice Mayors in charge of Economic Development and three Vice Mayors in charge of Social Affairs while five are women (Two Mayors, one Vice Mayor in charge of Economic Development and two Vice Mayors in charge of Social Affairs).

The City of Kigali:Elections conducted under the new governance structure



The City of Kigali is currently governed by law $N^{\circ} 22/2019$ of 29/07/2019 Governing the City of Kigali. This law scrapped the legal personality of itsformer three Districts (Nyarugenge, Gasabo, and Kicukiro). The reforms in the governance of the City of Kigali were conducted to ensure effectiveness and efficiency in planning and delivery to spur holistic development of the City as one entity

The City of Kigali is governed by a council composed of 11 councillors, including six (6) representing the three districts and five (5) members appointed by a Presidential Order.

Members of the Council of the City of Kigali have a term of office of five (5) years renewable.

The Executive committee of the City of Kigali is composed of three members, namely, the Mayor,

Vice Mayor in charge of Urbanisation and Infrastructure and Vice Mayor in charge of Socioeconomic Affairs.

According to the law, the Districts of the City of Kigali don't have councils. They are administrative organs with the main responsibilities of executing the plans of the City and providing services. The executive team of districts in the City of Kigali is composed of two members appointed by a Prime Minister's Order, namely, the District Executive Administrator and the Deputy District Executive Administrator.

The 2021 elections in the City of Kigali consisted of voting from village to Sector level.

National Councils elected their organs at District and City of Kigali levels.

Newly-elected local authorities complete induction training

On Monday 29 November 2021, newly-elected local government leaders completed an induction training held at Gishari Police Training School in Rwamagana District in the Eastern Province. The eight-day training conducted from 22 November was attended by over 500 local leaders including members of district Executive Committees and all councillors from 27 Districts and the City of Kigali. They also included the District Executive Administrators of the City of Kigali.

The training was organized by the Ministry of Local Government, RALGA and other partners as part of capacity building program meant to equip newly-elected local leaders with adequate understanding about local government system and its functioning as well as an overview on government priorities, policies and programs. During the training, officials from different institutions gave presentations about different topics including: the history of Rwanda, governance in Rwanda, effective communication and media relations, Rwanda's decentralisation policy, responsibilities of local government leaders and service delivery, national unity, partnership in governance and development, national security, the liberation struggle and the role of local leaders in sustaining achieved gains, among others.

The local leaders were also given an overview about the functioning of the Rwanda Association of Local Government Authorities (RALGA) to help them understanding its role in supporting local government entities to fulfil their responsibilities and their expected contribution in the functioning and governance of the Association.

President Kagame urges Local authorities to prioritize citizens' interests

At the occasion of closing the induction of newly elected local leaders, His Excellency Paul Kagame, President of the Republic of Rwanda, called up on local leaders to focus on addressing the needs of the citizens instead of putting forward their individual interests. President Paul Kagame reminded local leaders that they need to serve citizens who trusted them, by providing quality services and addressing

their most pressing issues

"Being leaders is beyond you as individuals, you are leaders because you represent the people. Therefore, wherever you are whether in your offices or anywhere else, keep in mind that you represent the people," President Kagame said.

"Anytime that leaders focus on their personal interests, problems arise and development get stuck," President Kagame stressed.

Some of the burning issues that President Kagame requested local leaders to urgently address include stunting, malnutrition, school dropout and service delivery. He also emphasized that frequent meetings should be reduced for local leaders to find time to attend to citizens' needs.




